As Jesus started on his way, a man ran up to him and fell on his knees before him. "Good teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" "Why do you call me good?" Jesus answered. You know the commandments: 'You shall not murder, you shall not commit adultery, you shall not steal, you shall not give false testimony, you shall not defraud, honour your father and mother." The disciples were even more amazed, and said to each other, "Who then can be saved?" Jesus looked at them and said, "With man this is impossible, but not with God; all things are possible with God." "Truly I tell you," Jesus replied, "no one who has left home or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields for me and the gospel will fail to receive a hundred times as much in this present age: homes, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and fields—along with persecutions—and in the age to come eternal life.

The rich and the kingdom of God

Today's Gospel comes from a chapter of Mark that is concerned with how to live a good and truthful life in the real world. Jesus discusses marriage and children, property and possessions, power and privilege. The children are perhaps the keystone to understanding his teaching. His disciples try to send the children away, but Jesus rebukes them, takes the children into his arms and blesses them - for of such are the kingdom of God. Just as the chapter will end with the story of the blind beggar, Bartimaeus, who becomes the image of true discipleship, so the children, who are powerless and insignificant in the eyes of society, become the image of those who understand and practise the presence of God in the world.

But the man who then runs up and kneels before Jesus is the image of one who is too rich and powerful to make this move. He undoubtedly has the potential; but he cannot overcome the obstacle of his wealth. This exchange upsets the disciples, for they have been conditioned to believe that wealth is a sign of God's love and approval. If it as hard as Jesus suggests, however, for a rich person to enter the kingdom, how can anyone achieve it? Jesus reassures them in two ways. First of all, what is impossible for humans is not impossible for God. Secondly, those who, like his disciples, give up everything for him will receive overwhelming recompense both now and in eternity. The message remains clear: to become like little children in their powerlessness is the way to God's favour.

The Living Word

Feasts of the Week

15 October - St Teresa of Jesus, virgin, doctor. Memorial.

Born at Avila (Spain) in 1515. Died at Alba de Tormes in 1582. Left her aristocratic family for the Carmelite monastery in Avila at the age of twenty, but only after two decades of dryness in prayer felt an inner conversion to Christ. Honoured as a spiritual writer and mystic who experienced and compre-hensively described the life of prayer. Remem-bered as a strong, practical reformer who restored the strict Carmelite observance of poverty, solitude, and austerity.

17 October – St Ignatius of Antioch, bishop, martyr. Memorial.

Born probably in Syria. Died a martyr in Rome about 107. At Antioch, where he was bishop, his death has been commemorated on this day since the fourth century. Remembered for seven letters written on his way to execution. They show him to be devoted to Christ and his resurrection; they urge Christians to unity in and through the Eucharist and around their local bishop. Called himself the "God-bearer."

18 October – St Luke, evangelist. Feast.

By early Christian tradition, Luke is named as author of the Third Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles. Almost certainly a Gentile and perhaps a companion of Saint Paul (29 June), he wrote to reassure those who had grown uncertain toward the end of the first century. In his gospel, the compassion of Christ is inclusive of all: Gentile and Jew, the poor and the rich, women and men, the outcast and the privileged.

Plenary Council 2020

The Australian Catholic Bishops have called a Plenary Council for 2020. This is a gathering of the Church in Australia to make decisions for the future and you are all invited to participate.

The Plenary Council gives us an opportunity to listen to what the Spirit is saying to the Church. In the preparation process, we are called to reflect, listen and share insights with one another as we respond to the three questions:

- 1. What do you think God is asking of us in Australia at this time?
- 2. What questions do you have about the future of the Church for the Council to consider in 2020?
- 3. Do you have a story of your experience of faith, or the Church you would like to share?

There will be scheduled meetings in our Parish in the near future. After we talk together, we will collect our stories and ideas and the questions we have about the future of the Church and give our submission to the Plenary Council Working Group who will consolidate and then forward them to the Council for discussion. Your voice will be greatly valued.
